# Ash Class

Year 1 have been learning how to add and subtract using a number line. We have spent time to ensure we are drawing the correct number of jumps, counting accurately and stopping on the right number. Reception have been continuing to show off their amazing subitising skills and have been matching the correct number to the value shown in pictures.

In Literacy, Ash Class have continued to build upon their descriptive writing skills by describing exciting and varied story locations. Reception have begun writing the initial sounds to their captions, with some challenging themselves to write the whole word.

Year I have accepted their challenge to write more, whilst still incorporating amazing adjectives, brilliant handwriting and the correct punctuation.

We have started to rehearse the songs for our Community Christmas Carol Service. Ash Class have decided on their top three roles that they would not mind having in the tableau. Over the coming weeks please keep an eye out for your child's part which will be written at the top of the costume letter. We will provide the outer costume, the letter outlines what would be suitable to wear underneath to keep warm. The service will take place over at the Church, on the evening of Wednesday 18th December.



### Oak Class

### Mrs Henning and Mrs Staniland

Since the last newsletter we have finished one enquiry and started another! The children all finished their books inspired by the story 'The Robot and The Bluebird' – illustrating them and producing a front and back cover on the computer. They are very proud of them and thoroughly enjoyed sharing them with Ash class.

Our next enquiry, which is science based, has been helping us to answer the question: 'How do temperature changes affect water and how does this relate to the water cycle?' We have looked at states of matter which was a new concept for many of the class. They are now able to articulate what it is and can discuss this together with how matter changes state. They learned about this through a fun practical experiment using cornflour and water. The children were amazed at how cornflour changes from a solid-powder – to liquid – and then when pressed together – a solid. We have also looked at gases and drank some water made in a soda stream and watched how plain flat water was made into sparkling water. They carried out an experiment called 'dancing raisins' where raisins placed in sparkling water danced up to the top of the glass and then sank again when the bubbles around them popped.

Building on this enquiry the children have also been learning the meaning of precipitation, evaporation, condensation and looked at the water cycle. The children hypothesised, made predictions and then carried out an experiment where they created their own water cycles by drawing the water cycle onto bags, part-filling them with water and then watching as condensation formed and dripped back into the water. A wow moment!



In Maths Year 2 have completed their work on addition and subtraction and have now moved onto shape. Year 3 have also completed their addition and subtraction unit and are now focused on multiplication and division. Keep up the fantastic work with your TTRockstars Oak Class! – it has been great to see the fantastic progress the children are making and the impact this has on their confidence in Maths.

In Religion and World Views Education (RWE) we are learning all about the Holy Trinity and baptism. We are looking forward to visiting the church soon so that Rev Jim can show us what happens in a baptism. Our next big event is 'The Community Christmas Carol Concert' and we are very busy practising our songs which help to make this such a lovely event. We look forward to seeing you there!

As a gentle reminder, please ensure that the children complete 3 minutes on Times Tables Rock Stars (TTRS) daily.



However, we made the most of it by holding a brilliant 'Parliament Day' right here in school. The day kicked off with a delicious breakfast, setting us up nicely for the activities ahead. We enjoyed a virtual tour of Parliament, which was both informative and engaging, and we delved into the fascinating aspects of the State Opening. The children certainly absorbed a lot of knowledge!



A set of family rules agreed on with children can promote the safe, responsible use of devices like tablets, smartphones, gaming consoles and computers. By developing rules around technology, it opens the conversation regarding boundaries and expectations, ensuring a healthy balance of screentime. This guide will help you to develop an

### **ENCOURAGE** HONESTY

Family rules ensure that everyone can have fun with their devices and be safe while doing so. Nonetheless, children may make mistakes as they learn to navigate the online world. Emphasise that if they ever feel worried, unsafe or upset about something they've done, sent, said or received, they should tell you immediately so you can help them resolve the problem.

### **CHARGING AND** OVERNIGHT STORAGE

To ensure children get the downtime they need evernight, it's important that devices – especially smartphones – are kept in a common space, where possible. This reduces the chance of pointiess late-night scrolling or sleep being disturbed by calls, messages or

### **REVIEW RULES** REGULARLY

Anything you agree on isn't set in stone. These rules will likely after as children get older and the way they use technology changes. Take time to review these as a family, discuss what's working, and what isn't. Communication is key—so by doing this, you involve the child in their own online safety while promoting an open dislocuse.

### **PROTECT PERSONAL**

Discuss and demonstrate the importance of protecting your personal information. 12 Talk about what details you share anline and Talk about what details you share aniline and who with. Use parental controls to block children from connecting with strangers, so that any information they do share is among their real friends. Ask a child's permission before posting any photos of them on social media, as this demonstrates positive online behaviour that they should learn and remember.

Highlight the importance of showing respect to others when using technology. Encourage children to speak kindly to others online – such as on social media, when playing multiplayer games or in group chats (which can often lend themselves to teasing behaviour), Explain that if they aren't treating others considerately, they might be made to stay away from their devices for a while.

### 8 "NO TECH" ZONES

Designating spaces in the house where technology isn't allowed (for example: bedrooms, bathrooms and at the dinner table) lets you keep an eye on what children are viewing and who they re communicating with gives you some quality, screen-free time with them, too, It also helps reduce any impulses to potentially engage with inappropriate content, as they're unlikely to do so in a common space within the home.

### AGREE ON CONSEQUENCES

As a family, discuss why the rules are important: to balance their screentime, to ensure everyone enjoys gaming or interacting online, and that they are safe when doing so. Therefore, if these rules are broken, there has to be a consequence Discuss what would be fair for certain breaches of the rules, as this can prevent a

### KNOW ALL 10 **PASSWORDS**

To protect children from inappropriate content, parents should have access to all passwords. Parents should also make it clear that they will check children's devices, should they have any concerns about their use. Emphasise that this isn't due to a lock of trust but is an extra way of keeping them safe.
